With the insane prices we are seeing at the grocery store these days we still spend much less than most countries. India spends 51.3%, South Africa 27%, Italy 17.2%, of their income on food! The United States spends 10%. Maybe that will make you feel a little better when you check out at the grocery store! Remember to support your farmers markets and local farms that are usually open on the weekends.

With the temperatures rising it is time to mulch around your flowers, shrubs, and trees. Mulch will retain soil moisture and control weeds. Remember to plant native and/or drought-tolerant plants. Group plants together based on similar water needs.

Now is the time to check all hoses, connectors, and spigots. Replace or add washers if you find leaks. Water lawns during early morning hours to reduce losses from evaporation. Be mindful of local watering restrictions.

Remember to bring used ink cartridges, batteries, and plastic bottle tops to the club meeting. A box will be labeled for drop off.

Please record the time you spend on reading about or researching environmental issues, planning, or working in your garden or yard, and picking up litter while you walk. All of your recorded time counts toward the end-of-year Environment Report for our club.

It's been over two years since club members could visit onsite at the Clayton State University (CSU) Archives due to COVID precautions and regulations. Just imagine how elated Lois Wolfe and Feechi Hall (university archivist) were when they met at the Archives on May 13. Lois brought Scrapbooks documenting the club's work from 2018-2020, which Feechi added to the MCWC Records Collection for later scanning and processing.

Now the work begins! On June 16 (time TBD), Feechi, Lois, and any members who would like to assist will begin planning, creating, and installing an exhibit for the August club meeting program. It will highlight the relationship between CSU and our organization, particularly in the area of women's scholarships.

70% or more receive scholarships to attend TFS.


They focus not only on academics but creativity, team building, and building a business sense and work ethic.
