Do you recall the traveling exhibit that was displayed during last year's August meeting? The installation highlighted the relationship between Clayton State University (CSU) and our organization concerning women's scholarships offered by MCWC since 1982! Well, this year the exhibit is going to be even larger with a full installation in the CSU Library Archives. Both Feechi Hall, the CSU Archivist, and Lois Wolfe, the WHRC Chair, agreed that the information would be perfect for the 2023 Women's History exhibit at the university. With the assistance of a graphic artist, the mobile exhibit will be stylized to fill the larger space in the CSU Exhibition Hall.

"Scholarships Empowering Women" will be available for viewing March through early April, which is great because it coincides with the timeframe to apply for this year's financial award. Even better is that students viewing the exhibit who meet the Andrea Lane Memorial Scholarship criteria can scan a QRCode that will take them directly to our club's website and online application. The Georgia Coalition Against Domestic Violence Stand with Survivors Day was held on Tuesday, Feb. 14<sup>th</sup> at the Georgia state capital. Changemakers participated in a virtual training the day prior to learn what the "asks" were of our Legislators. Pam, Lois, Mary, and Joy represented our club and participated in the training. Lois, Mary, and Joy attended the Stand with Survivors Day at the capital to ask their legislators to support the GCADV's asks and/or help champion their asks into a bill. The four asks were:

- 1. Safe Time
- 2. Keep Firearms out of the hands of Abusers
- 3. Safe at Home Address Confidentiality
- 4. Funding Victim Services

Are you following the current legislative session on <a href="www.legis.ga.gov">www.legis.ga.gov</a>? If not, what are you waiting for? Women worked hard to give us the right to vote, and we do vote but are we aware of current issues being addressed (or not addressed) by our representatives? Check out this site and STAY INFORMED! Important dates for this year's General Assembly include March 6 – Crossover Day and March 29 – Sine Die Day. Email Lois Wolfe a brief explanation as to why these two dates are important to be included in a drawing for a prize.

At our February meeting, a tri-board was set up with sticky notes for members to write a few words about issues and concerns of importance to them. The following areas were recorded – Women's Health Care, Senior Safety, Litter and the Environment, Abortion Rights, Gun Violence, Palestinian Rights, Homelessness, and Panhandling. In response, members suggested we attend local council meetings, create a neighborhood watch, adopt a nursing home, and participate in social gatherings. This board will be set up in March so that articles and information on issues pertinent to Arts and Culture (the meeting's featured CSP) can be posted. Of course, if there's any burning issue outside of that area, it may be added to the board.

On February 13-14, four club members prepared and participated in the **Stand with Survivors Day** at the GA Capitol. We met with Senator Gail Davenport who took us to meet Lt. Gov. Burt Jones in the Senate Chamber. In all, GFWC GA was represented by 5 clubs and 15 members. This Advocacy Campaign to support victims of domestic violence was "spotlighted" on February 23 in the GFWC's News and Notes. Currently, our club has completed 8 of the 10 GFWC Legislation Scavenger Hunt items and has earned bonus points. Great work ladies! Be sure to record on your Legislation Plan of
