Below is how you can help, however please continue to check the newsletter each month for any updates and new opportunities.

You will bring everything you wish to donate to our **November** meeting.

- Collect non-perishable items such as canned peas, corn, veg-all, black beans, pinto beans or green beans, rice, dry beans, canned tuna, canned beef stew, canned pasta, store brand pasta sides (not mac-n-cheese) canned soups, canned fruit, instant potatoes, boxed stuffing, gravy mix, and canned sweet potatoes for the First Baptist Church of Morrow Food Pantry. Watch expiration dates! NOTE: Please feel free to bring on a monthly basis if you desire and keep track of your donations.
- 2. Collect toys and monetary donations to support Salvation Army Forgotten Angels project for Christmas.
- 3. Collect individualized snacks such at crackers, popcorn, chips, protein bars, dried fruit, trial mix, candy, nuts, and/or small bottles of water to assemble and deliver CARE baskets to Clayton County Water Authority, The First Bank (formerly Heritage Bank), and Clayton County 911. September is National Preparedness month. National Preparedness Month is an observance each September to raise awareness about the importance of preparing for disasters and emergencies that could happen at any time.

2023 Theme: Preparing for Older Adults

Please take a look at this website concerning this years topic of concern. The Ready Campaign's 2023 National Preparedness Month theme is "**Take Control in 1, 2, 3**". The campaign will focus on preparing older adults for disasters, specifically older adults from communities that are disproportionally impacted by the all-hazard events, which continue to threaten the nation.

#### **Emergency Preparedness: Take Control in 3 Steps**

By taking a few simple steps, you can become better prepared to face a range of emergencies that could occur anytime and anywhere.

- Step 1: Make a Plan: You may not be with your family when disaster strikes, so it is important to plan ahead for how to get to a safe place, contact loved ones and reunite once the emergency is over. Online planning tools for families, businesses and places of worship can be found at <u>ReadyNOVA</u>.
- Step 2: Build a Kit. Being prepared means having your own food, water and other supplies to last for at least 72 hours. A disaster supplies kit is a collection of basic items your household may need in the event of an emergency, such as water, non-perishable food, flashlights and batteries. If you have a pet, include items such as a selfie with your pet in case you get separated, medicine and grooming items as well as a collar and leash.
- Step 3: Be Informed: Know the types of <u>hazards</u> that may occur and how you will receive information before, during and after an emergency. Monitor local weather forecasts from the <u>National Weather Service</u>.
