As we look forward to the new year, let's take a quick look back at some of our accomplishments in 2023. Continuing with our recycling theme, we were introduced to Free cycling. We also kept harmful chemicals and recyclable materials out of our landfills and water supplies by disposing of outdated prescriptions, batteries, and printer cartridges properly. # Special Project: Women's History Resource Center

#### Special Project: Women's History Resource Center (WHRC)

Did you know that GFWC Facebook has "WHRC Wednesdays" on the GFWC FB page? Every Wednesday, there is something new to learn. Have any of you watched the series, "The Gilded Age"? It's a period piece from Julian Fellowes, who wrote and created "Downton Abbey". Below is the January 17, 2024, WHRC Wednesday entry, which is of particular interest for "Gilded Age" viewers and federated women. It turns out that Emily Warren Roebling, who completed the Brooklyn Bridge project when her husband became ill (Season 2 of the series) was also a GFWC member! It's WHRC Wednesday! Emily Warren Roebling (1843-1903) is having a bit of a moment, thanks to her recent portrayal on the tv series "The Gilded Age." If she hasn't popped up on your television, historical novel, or social media feed, Roebling was an engineer who stepped in when her husband, Washington Roebling, became ill and unable to finish a project... a paltry little thing called the Brooklyn Bridge, completed in 1883. It's a great story, and it's fantastic that in recent years she's been getting her due.


But for our purposes, there's even more - and huge thanks to the GFWC members who alerted the WHRC to the fact that Roebling was a dedicated clubwoman and an active member of Sorosis (NY). In the 1890s, she served as Chair of Philanthropy and First Vice President for Sorosis; worked with the Board of Lady Managers of the World's Columbian Exposition (1893); and was in charge of the arrangements for the New York State Federation of Women's Clubs 1900 convention in Albany. She was also a member of the DAR, the George Washington Memorial Association, and the Relief Society, and she even went back to school to study law, graduating from NYU in 1899.

Upon her death in 1903, the Brooklyn Daily Eagle noted not only her work on the bridge, but also made sure to add, "The executive ability and intellectuality which enabled her to prove so valuable an assistant and substitute to her husband manifested itself in her club life." So the next time someone mentions Roebling's story to you, make sure you throw in her work with Sorosis, and her connection with GFWC! #clubwomeninhistory #clubwomeninaction

On MLK Day, six club members joined parishioners at St. Philip Benizi (SPB) Church in Jonesboro in a "Day On" of Service. The speaker, Karimah Dillard, Director of Policy at the GA Coalition Against Domestic Violence (GCADV) provided an overview of domestic violence in our state. Did you know that every 2 days someone in Georgia dies in a domestic violence incident? In 2022, in our state, there were more than 50,000 reports of domestic violence to law enforcement and twice as many crises calls to domestic violence agencies. Ms. Dillard explained how GCADV collaborates with others to stop domestic violence, advocates for responsive public policy, and empowers survivors.

Three service projects were completed, keeping in mind that MLK Day is a day of service. Donations given by the SPB community and visitors including MCWC members were sorted and boxed for Securus House, a local safe and emergency shelter for all victims of family violence. Cards of hope were crafted for the victims. Letters were composed for state representatives to advocate for more effective policies and services for domestic violence victims. Samples of the letters will be available at the February club meeting, so members who were unable to participate in the MLK Day event can write their representatives regarding domestic violence legislation.

The 10th SPB MLK Day Celebration ended with a prayer for victims of domestic violence, distribution of GCADV resources, and an invitation to participate in the "Stand with Survivors" Day at the GA Capitol on February 7 (find details at <a href="https://www.gcadv.org">www.gcadv.org</a> and below).

(https://gcadv.org/). The Georgia Coalition Against Domestic Violence is hosting an advocacy 101 webinar and an in-person kick-off event. Let's be sure MCWC is present at one or both events. ### **Legislation and Public Policy**




#### The Power of You: State Federations and the Legislative Action Center

Four members of MCWC registered for "The Power of You: An Advocacy Webinar Series". The final 7<sup>th</sup> episode occurred on Monday, January 29. Participants learned how to use the GFWC Legislative Action Center (LAC) to bring about change at the state level. The session shared how one club member reading an article in a local paper led to a state federation's support of two pending bills on domestic violence reform.

Soon, we'll celebrate Valentine's Day. Imagine living during a time when women could not vote. You might have presented a card to your husband or boyfriend (or even male relatives and friends) like the one pictured above. Suffragists used holidays like Valentine's Day to promote the cause of "Votes for Women". This card appeals to men for support for suffrage by suggesting that women respect and love men who support the cause.

Now, all women have the right to vote. All club members vote, but are you following the current legislative session? MCWC makes it easy to do.
