The GFWC Civic Engagement and Outreach Community Service Program reminds GFWC members that each of us is a part of a larger society and is responsible for undertaking actions that will create a better quality of life and foster a sense of community—locally, regionally, nationally, and globally. This Community Service Program highlights and encourages citizenship; crime prevention, safety, and disaster preparedness; the needy, hungry, and homeless; and our military personnel and veterans.

#### **Educational Moment: National Teach Children To Save Day**

Each year on the fourth Thursday in April, National Teach Children to Save Day encourages children to develop good saving habits. Sponsored by the American Bankers Association, National Teach Children To Save Day has been helping young people since 1997 when the program started.

Bankers across the country volunteer every year to teach children to save. Developing these habits at a young age creates a foundation for a lifetime of saving. Involving our children with a savings plan, and money management skills prepare them for a solid future. Parents and grandparents should teach children about financial matters so that when they head out into the world, they avoid pitfalls that can be financially devastating. With an early start on saving and an understanding of budgeting their money, children will have solid habits as they head into adulthood.

Help your children or grandchildren develop the skills they will need for a lifetime. Below are some tips to get started:

Give each child a bank. It helps if the bank is clear so they can see their savings grow.

Gopen a savings account. They can monitor their account and watch it grow there, too.

- □□Show them what things cost. When they want a new toy, direct them to their savings. Ask them to consider whether a toy is worth the amount they want to spend. If they still want to purchase the item, have the child pay. The act of paying with their own money will demonstrate to them the cost of the toy.
- Demonstrate need versus want. Explain how our food, clothing, and shelter are necessities. However, we can live without going out to eat or buying a new television or the latest phone. Place the needs before the wants even in your daily shopping.

While in Washington, DC, Lois Wolfe and Mary Harmon were able to attend GFWC Women's History Month Celebration held at GFWC Headquarters on March 6. They enjoyed meeting the GFWC WHRC Librarian, Joanna Church, and hearing the presentations on Heart Health (Jude Maboné – Miss DC 2023) and GFWC History in 15 Artifacts (Joanna Church). In December 2016, both Mary and Lois visited the GFWC Headquarters and Archives along with six other MCWC members. Mary and Lois noticed all the changes made in the Archives since then.

On February 19, 2024, Lois and Mary searched our club's documents held at the Clayton State University's Archives. The purpose of the search was to find concrete evidence that the Morrow Junior Woman's Club did in fact play a critical role in establishing the Clayton County Morrow Public Library. Descriptions exist about "one of our club's greatest achievements," which is the establishment of the Morrow Branch of the Clayton County Library System. However, no actual news articles or letters were placed in the club's scrapbooks documenting the process.

2025 will mark the 50<sup>th</sup> year of the Morrow Public Library, and it is hoped that MCWC's role will be shared in the celebration. If one reads about the establishment of the Clayton County Library System, s/he will learn how the Jonesboro Woman's Club founded the Jonesboro Library in 1941. However, there is no mention of the Morrow Junior Woman's Club role in the Clayton County Library System. Therefore, Lois and Mary have embarked on a quest to discover REAL PROOF that our organization did indeed play a vital part in bringing a library to Morrow, Georgia. After hours of searching, Mary pulled out a notebook of Education Department Reports and BINGO! There, staring them in the face,

was actual proof! Here are a few of the documents they found: "Morrow women seek help for new library" (Clayton News Daily, December 20, 1974); a letter from the President of the Lake Harbin Elementary PTA to the Clayton County Commissioners and cc: Morrow Junior Woman's Club recognizing and supporting the concept of a public library in the Morrow, Rex, and Ellenwood area (January 31, 1975); and a letter from the Administrator of the Clayton County Libraries to the Morrow Junior Woman's Club thanking members for all they had done to have the library in the Morrow area become a reality (August 8, 1975).

Consider this thought: What if the club members had NOT completed and submitted an Education Department report to the District/State? We would have NO proof, only our word, that our organization's most important, lasting impact on our local community truly occurred. Scary, huh? The reason we write reports really takes on a new meaning that is of GREAT IMPORTANCE. Right?

Well now the work begins to take all data and put it into a form that our local library and representatives will view as sufficient documentation to publicize the role of the Morrow Junior/Civic Woman's Club in the establishment of the Morrow Public Library. Hopefully, when the Morrow Public Library celebrates its 50<sup>th</sup> year of operation, the Morrow Civic Woman's Club members will be present (and likely providing refreshments) on that day!









SB324 has passed both the Senate and House and is headed to Governor Kemp's office for his signature! This Bill creates a victim-centered address confidentiality program for survivors of human trafficking, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. By shielding each victim's physical address, future harm can be prevented, fear and isolation can be reduced, and ultimately lives can be saved! Thank you, club sisters, for responding to the urgent calls to action and for making this happen!

Over the years, MCWC has supported Haven House, a nonprofit organization in Henry County, which serves victims of domestic violence. As members, we can continue this support by donating gently used household items and clothing to the Blessings Thrift Store. Giving home furnishings to the thrift store helps families as they begin to rebuild their lives. Haven House sets them up in new homes with the items they need such as beds, dressers, dining tables, living room furniture, cookware, and dishes. When items are not used by Haven House families, they may be sold to provide income to the shelter for purchasing food and supplies.

It is now officially Spring, so as you engage in your spring cleaning, please think about making donations to the Blessings Thrift Store, which is located at 18 Depot Street, just off the square in

McDonough. The store is open Tuesday-Saturday 9:00am-4:30pm. Donations are accepted on Tuesday-Saturday 9:00am-4:00pm. Please remember to record a list of your donations for the end of year Domestic Violence club report.

The Blessings Thrift Store accepts donations of gently used clothing, furniture, household items, toys, and linens. Donors receive a tax donation receipt at the time of donation. For questions, call 770.337.3886.



### Legislation and Public Policy

During April, Lois Wolfe will complete and submit our club's actions on the 2022-2024 GFWC Legislation and Public Policy Scavenger Hunt. The project was intended to encourage legislative advocacy on the local, state, and national levels, while also recognizing GFWC as an organization. If you have contacted your representatives about issues during the 2024 Georgia Legislative session, please share that information with Lois so she can include your advocacy in our club's numbers.

One of the actions that will be reported in the Scavenger Hunt is Senate Resolution 648 by Senators Davenport of the 44., Anderson of the 43. and Parent of the 42. Adopted in the Senate February 21, 2024. "BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE that the members of this body congratulate and commend Mrs. Peggy Wilson, the GFWC Georgia, and Morrow Civic Woman's Club." On March 18, 2024, Peggy was recognized and honored at the Georgia Capitol for being selected as GFWC Georgia's Jennie Award recipient!


