COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAMS

The GFWC Civic Engagement and Outreach Community Service Program reminds GFWC members that each of us is a part of a larger society and is responsible for undertaking actions that will create a better quality of life and foster a sense of community—locally, regionally, nationally, and globally. This Community Service Program highlights and encourages citizenship; crime prevention, safety, and disaster preparedness; the needy, hungry, and homeless; and our military personnel and veterans.

Educational Moment: Constitution Day and Citizenship Day

Constitution Day commemorates the formation and signing of the U.S. Constitution by thirty-nine brave men on September 17, 1787, recognizing all who are born in the U.S. or by naturalization, have become citizens.

Below is some information about one of those Founding Fathers: Abraham Baldwin

One of Abraham Baldwin's strongest beliefs was that education was the key behind the development of the American frontier, including states like Georgia. Mr. Baldwin turned down a highly sought after teaching position as professor of divinity at Yale; however the governor at the time, Lyman Hall, induced him to undertake on the heavy responsibility of developing an educational plan for secondary and post-secondary education in Georgia.

Upon his election to the Georgia House of Representatives, Abraham Baldwin introduced an educational plan that included land grants from the State of Georgia to fund a new University – the University of Georgia, in

Athens, GA. Under his guidance and direction, UGA was to become the very first state-chartered educational institution when it was incorporated on January 27, 1785. UGA was a State university which was run on State funds, assuring that youth had the option to attend higher education if they wanted to but could not afford to. UGA was designed to be quite similar to Yale, where Mr. Baldwin attended University.

Abraham Baldwin moved to Georgia where he received the necessary approval through the legislature to practice law. He then applied for a land grant in Wilkes County. Later in his political career, Abraham Baldwin sat in the assembly as well as the Continental Congress. His work in the formulation of the Articles of Confederation was invaluable.

Mr. Baldwin continued to remain involved in politics during the years that he was President at the University of Georgia. He served five terms consecutively starting in 1789, in the US House of Representatives, as well as two terms also consecutive, from 1799 to 1807 in the U.S. Senate.

Goals for Pollinator Census project

- 1. To create sustainable pollinator habitat by educating gardeners about using plants that provide nutrition for our pollinators while handling our summer droughts and do not have disease or pest insect pressure.
- 2. To increase the entomological literacy of our citizens. As I mentioned to one teacher, we want students to go from "oooo, it's a bug" to "look at the tarsal claw on that bee!"
- 3. To generate useful data about our pollinator populations, so we can begin to spot trends and see how pollinator populations are affected by weather and how honey bees influence native bee populations.

A Tip to Try before the actual days of counting...practice a time or two to see how it goes.

Pollinator plants are <u>VITAL</u> in supporting pollinators that visit your gardens. The seed packets will help you get a good start on your pollinator journey. It is important to select plants that will tolerate the climate conditions in your area.











WHO GIVES A CRAP?

Toilet paper from bamboo? Who Gives a Crap? https://us.whogivesacrap.org/pages/home

The toilet paper that is made from bamboo, NOT virgin timber. What a great idea... I can vouch for this product, I use it, it is good stuff.

Who Gives A Crap started when we learned that 2.4 billion people don't have access to a toilet (now 2 billion – yay for progress!).

That's roughly 40% of the global population and means that around 289,000 children under five die every year from diarrheal diseases caused by poor water and sanitation.

That's almost 800 children per day, or one child every two minutes.

Simon sat on a toilet in our draughty warehouse and refused to move until we had raised enough pre-orders to start production. 50 hours and one cold bottom later, we'd raised over \$50,000 (see the video here!)

We delivered our first product in March 2013 and have been thrilled to keep growing ever since. Not just because our toilet paper is gracing bathrooms across the country but also because **we donate 50% of our profits to help build toilets and improve sanitation in the developing world.**


Legislation and Public Policy
