The GFWC Civic Engagement and Outreach Community Service Program reminds GFWC members that each of us is a part of a larger society and is responsible for undertaking actions that will create a better quality of life and foster a sense of community—locally, regionally, nationally, and globally. This Community Service Program highlights and encourages citizenship; crime prevention, safety, and disaster preparedness; the needy, hungry, and homeless; and our military personnel and veterans.

Educational Moment: The National Woman Suffrage Parade

On March 3, 1913, 5000 women marched up Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington, D.C. to demand the right to vote. The march was the first large political march on Washington and the first civil rights march to use the U.S. Capitol as a backdrop.

What Happened:

- The march took place the day before Woodrow Wilson's inauguration as the 28th president.
- The march was organized by Alice Paul and Lucy Burns for the National American Woman Suffrage Association (NAWSA).
- The marchers carried banners, sashes, postcards, letters, and photographs.
- The march included bands, mounted brigades, floats, an allegorical pageant, and a contingent of male supporters.
- The march was challenging due to segregation at the time.
- The march was a turning point in the fight for the vote.

Who Participated:

- Inez Milholland led the march on a white horse.
- Fola La Follette, a Broadway actress, led the actress group.
- Lillian Wald, founder of community nursing, led the nurses' section.
- Ellen Spencer Mussey, a D.C. attorney, led women lawyers in the procession

How the GFWC supported the suffrage:

- In 1914, the GFWC passed a resolution supporting political equality for women and men.
- The GFWC's magazine kept members informed of efforts to pass a national suffrage amendment.
- The GFWC's activities helped make suffrage a mainstream cause for middle-class women.

Classic briefs, High-cut briefs, full briefs, Hipster OR Bikini. They DON'T ACCEPT boyshorts, Tanga, Thong, or G-String.

- 2. 100% Cotton Washcloths NO white or microfiber
- 3. Soap 1oz or less bar
- 4. 100% Woven Cotton fabric Used to make shields
- 5. 100% Cotton Flannel Used for the liners NOTE: All fabrics must be new and unlaundered. Bright, colorful, stain busting fabrics work best!
- 6. Snaps any color is fine as long as they are Size 20
- 7. Thread any color polyester thread, Orange is the most helpful color
- 8. Measuring tape
- 9. 5/8" grosgrain ribbon any color, Orange is the most helpful color
- **10.** Drawstring Threader



Legislation and Public Policy

The following Call to Action was sent by the GA Coalition Against Domestic Violence on February 20.



GEORGIA COALITION AGAINST DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

All open solicitations have been removed from the OVW (Office of Violence Against Women) website. Our domestic violence programs rely heavily on Federal funding and any threats to this funding will put survivors' lives in danger. The chaos, frustration, and fear that has reverberated throughout our movement since the first executive order is palpable.

Not having access to federal funds would endanger access to essential services for survivors, including emergency shelter, legal representation, mental health care, and more. Programs will be forced to immediately end lifesaving services, lay off staff, and even close their doors entirely to survivors and their children who are fleeing abuse and have nowhere else to go. Without access to federally funded services, victims may be forced to stay in unsafe situations while struggling to regain their independence and rebuild their lives.
